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WELCOME

Dear Colleagues:

Welcome to Atlanta! By now we assume you have been committed enough to Division 39, intrigued enough by our theme, and eager enough to hear our keynote speakers that you have been willing to commit time and money to participate with us in our ongoing task to make Division 39 your intellectual and emotional home. From Friday to Sunday we will have a morning plenary session that will hopefully fuel you with coffee but also ideas from our keynote speakers that will further these ongoing conversations.

Through our coffee hours, our afternoon breaks, and our evening receptions we hope to place the emphasis of the meeting on you and to build, however briefly, a community that will come together to experience the challenge and excitement of the psychoanalytic project. The Steering Committee's task is done. We hope you will take up our challenge to make this meeting yours.

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CONTINUING EDUCATION CREDITS

The Division of Psychoanalysis is approved by the American Psychological Association (APA) to sponsor continuing education (CE) for psychologists. Division 39 maintains responsibility for these programs and their content. Wednesday Master Classes and Spring Meeting programs are open to all mental health professionals, and participants may receive CE credit for attending these programs. Participants from professions other than psychology should consult with their respective licensing boards regarding the acceptance of APA-approved Certificates of Attendance as documentation of CE. For programs sixty minutes in duration or longer, one credit is awarded for each hour of CE activity, with additional quarter-increments of CE credit awarded beyond one hour; for example, attending a one-hour-and-fifty-minute program will yield 1.75 CE credits. **50-minute programs are not available for CE credit**.

Wednesday Master Classes require registration separate from general registration for the Spring Meeting and are offered for additional fees. At the conclusion of Master Classes, participants will receive a paper certificate of attendance upon completing a paper evaluation form.

Perversion—To Die in Order to Live?

This intermediate continuing education workshop offers a dialogue about the constructive twinning of pain and pleasure as the "Pleasure to bust the limits" of conventional and inter-generationally transmitted cultural norms. We will look at perversion, and Sado-Masochism in particular, as an integral part of aggression, with the potential to serve as agent of "de-linking" and thus "re-linking" and as an essential component of our phylogenetic and ontogenetic development. Perversions, when experienced by a non-psychotic adult, offer new survival experiences for the "bonded Self" by challenging the body's limits and thus tap into the uncontained, undefined, non-psychotic reverie that is the core of childhood and adult creativity and sexuality.

Yudit Jung, PhD, LCSW is a practicing psychoanalyst in Atlanta, Georgia. With over 30 years of clilnical experience, Dr. Jung is an APsaA-certified Training and Supervising Analyst and faculty of the Emory University Psychoanalytic Institute.

The Integrative Treatment of Complex Dissociative Disorders

This workshop will offer an overview of the current standard of care with complex dissociative disorders. Recent naturalistic treatment outcome studies indicate these patients do best when the therapist directly and consistently addresses dissociation, while also attending to the many other complex issues endemic to developmental trauma and profound attachment disruptions. We will briefly explore the intertwined psychological and biological foundations of these disorders and their impact on sense of self, reflective functioning, regulatory capacities, and attachment. We will discuss treatment that is embedded in a modified psychodynamic frame and case formulation, and that integrates a wide variety of other approaches that have shown to be effective with this challenging population.

Kathy Steele, MN, CS, APRN is an internationally recognized trauma specialist, author, psychotherapist, and consultant. She has practiced in Atlanta, Georgia for over 30 years. Kathy has co-authored numerous book chapters, journal articles, and two award winning books on trauma and dissociation: *The Haunted Self: Structural Dissociation of the Personality and Treatment of Chronic Traumatization* (2006; Norton Press) and *Coping with Trauma-Related Dissociation: Skills Training for Patients and Therapists* (2011; Norton Press).

A Therapist's Guide to New Media: How to Promote Your Practice and Expertise Through Websites, Blogging, and Social Media

Blogging, Tweeting, Facebooking—a decade ago these verbs didn't exist and therapists were dependent on offline social networks for referrals. Now, it's a brave new world, filled with brave new ways to reach clients, network with other therapists, and promote your expertise. This workshop offers practical, hands-on strategies for promoting your practice in the 21st century, including free steps you can take today to implement and interconnect a webpage, blog, and social media—the basic building blocks of a respectable online presence. This workshop assumes basic computer literacy of word processing and web surfing (email, Google, etc.), but requires no prior experience with webpages or any esoteric computer-ish stuff beyond the English language.

Psychoanalytic Dreamwork: The Bridge Between I and Thou

Since dream interpretation deals directly with the unconscious, a consciously psychoanalytic approach to this work is particularly important. Based on the premise that it is essential to keep the patient's experience of the dream central to the interpretive process, the workshop will focus on ways to minimize contamination by the therapist's projections, countertransference reactions, and theoretical orientation. At the same time effective dream work occurs primarily within a collaborative relationship. Therefore, we will examine the role of the therapist as one of helping the patient freely engage with dream material as the true expert of the dream using a relational perspective as a frame for psychoanalytic technique.

Kendle Hassinger, LPC is a psychoanalyst and has practiced psychotherapy in Atlanta, Georgia for 24 years. She has led dream process groups and workshops for nearly 20 years.

The DSM-V and the Psychodynamic Diagnostic Manual—Revised

This workshop will compare and contrast the Psychodynamic Diagnostic Manual, Revised (PDM2) with the revised Diagnostic and Statistical Manual (DSM-V). The DSM-V diagnostic system has little to do with how actual clinicians think and work. The PDM2 was developed with an explicit focus on how diagnosis can guide actual clinical work taking into account the patient's personality patterns, as well as cognitive, affective, and psychosocial resources, before considering the symptomatic patterns that led the patient to seek change. Grounded in psychoanalytic and attachment research, the PDM2 provides a useful tool for all clinicians.

Robert M. Gordon, PhD, ABPP is an expert in the use of the Minnesota Multiphasic Personality Inventory (MMPI) with extensive clinical and research experience on the value of personality assessment in diagnosis and treatment. He is associate editor of the PDM2.



Starting a Practice: Let's Talk About Money (Practical Tips and Theoretical Considerations)





Despite the fact that American culture is fueled by fantasies of inexhaustible resources and limitless possibility, psychoanalysis has engaged with the issue of natural limitation ever since Freud emphasized the inevitable tension between bottomless human desire and the demands of civilized life. Dr. McWiliams will explore a dilemma central to the human condition: although limitation evokes primal frustration, it also creates the conditions of Balint's "area of creativity."

Contemplative Practices and Psychoanalytic Process

The panel will address the challenges arising when contemplative practices are introduced to clinical or highly distressed populations (battered women, incarcerated populations, suicidal populations, etc). Drawing from their work, the panel will present data and discuss the challenges faced when non-clinicians teach contemplative or mindfulness practices to at-risk populations. The intersections of contemplative practice, trauma and psychotherapy will be discussed.

FRANÇOISE DAVOINE has worked as a psychoanalyst for more than 30 years at a public psychiatric hospital and in private practice along with her late husband, Jean-Max Gaudilliere. She is currently professor at the Ecole des Hautes Etudes en Science Sociales in Paris and has advanced degrees in the classics and French, and doctorates in sociology. She is a member of the International Symposium for the Psychotherapy of Schizophrenia (US branch). In the course of their work with patients in psychiatric hospitals and private

practice, Françoise and Jean-Max uncovered ways in which transference and countertransference are affected by the experience of social catastrophe. Handed down from one generation to the next, the unspoken horrors of war, betrayal, dissociation, and disaster in the families of patient and analyst alike are not only revived in the therapeutic relationship, but, when understood, actually provide the keys to the healing process. Through examples from medieval carnivals and Japanese No Theater, to Wittgenstein and Hannah Arendt, to Sioux rituals in North Dakota, they have described the ways in which psychological damage is done—and undone. With her late husband, she is the author of *Wittgenstein's Folly and History Beyond Trauma*. She recently published *Mother's Folly*, currently being made into a movie.

SA-19 Two Films and Two Discussions

The Mark of War, a documentary film, by Ricardo Ainslie, PhD, ABPP

This film is about the lives of seven Vietnam War veterans. It is an intimate, psychological portrait of their lives before going to war, their experiences in Vietnam, and their lives since their return. The filmmaker is a psychologist/psychoanalyst and the interviews reflect that sensibility as does the structure of the film itself. The film is driven by the veterans' stories, describing their struggles to digest what they had seen, what they had lived, and what they had done in Vietnam. Using an open and reflective interview style, the film is more psychological and personal rather than historical in its treatment of the experiences of these men, some of whom he had interviewed on and off for over 10 years. The film draws us into their worlds.

Ethics and Trauma in Hannah Arendt by Margarethe Von Trotta

The presentation begins with the viewing of the film, Hannah Arendt, by Margarethe Von Trotta, which focuses on the fierce debate that Hannah Arendt ignited over half a century ago (and that continues to this day) when she covered the trial of Adolf Eichmann. Hannah Arendt reminds us that films have become an optimal repository for images of some of the most compelling and cataclysmic events of our time—images that portray the complex and conflictual dynamics of individual lives unfolding against the often traumalogenic social and historic forces of the 20th century. The panel will lead a discussion of the film's portrayal of Hannah Arendt's interpretation of Eichmann's "inability to think," which culminates in the controversial notion of the "banality of evil." We will explore whether or not and how this can be addressed under the APA Code of Ethics, and to what extent Arendt's thinking might be relevant to the ethical failures and challenges brought up by the recent events in APA.

SU-1 Psychoanalytic Reflections on Limitation: Aging, Dying, Generativity, and Renewal

Limits—and the limit of mortality in particular—makes us hot and bothered. Despite the fact that American culture is fueled by fantasies of inexhaustible resources and limitless possibility, psychoanalysis has engaged with the issue of natural limitation ever since Freud emphasized the inevitable tension between bottomless human desire and the demands of civilized life. Dr. McWilliams will explore a dilemma central to the human condition: although limitation evokes primal frustration, it also creates the conditions of Balint's "area of creativity."

NANCY MCWILLIAMS teaches at Rutgers University's Graduate School of Applied & Professional Psychology and has a private practice in Flemington, NJ. She is the author of *Psychoanalytic Diagnosis* (1994; rev. ed. 2011), Psychoanalytic Case Formulation (1999), and *Psychoanalytic Psychotherapy* (2004), all with Guilford Press. She is Associate Editor of the *Psychodynamic Diagnostic Manual* (2006; rev. ed. due 2016). She is a former president of the Division of Psychoanalysis (39) and is on the editorial board of *Psychoanalytic*

Psychology. Her awards have included the Gradiva prize (1999), the Goethe Scholarship Award (2012), the Rosalee Weiss Award for contributions to practice (2004), the Laughlin distinguished teacher award (2007), the Hans Strupp Award for teaching, practice and writing (2014), and the Division 39 awards for both Leadership (2005) and Scholarship (2012). Dr. McWilliams is an honorary member of the American Psychoanalytic Association, the Moscow Psychoanalytic Society, and the Warsaw Scientific Association for Psychodynamic Psychotherapy. Her writings have been translated into 20 languages.

MIRIAM STEELE is a Professor and Director of Clinical Training in Psychology at the New School for Social Research. She bridges the world of psychoanalytic thinking and clinical practice with contemporary research in child development. She trained as a child analyst at the Anna Freud Centre London and received her Ph.D. from University College London. Her research began with the study of "Intergenerational Patterns of Attachment" which embodied one of the first prospective longitudinal studies incorporating the Adult Attachment Interview

and Strange Situation protocols. This work was important in initiating the concept of reflective functioning and providing empirical data to demonstrate the importance of parental states of mind in the social and emotional development of their children with a longitudinal focus on their development into adulthood. Currently, Dr. Steele is a co-investigator on a federally funded grant "Birth to Three: A Pragmatic Clinical Trial for Child Maltreatment Prevention." Her other projects include studies exploring attachment and body representations in mother-child dyads, and studies of child development in families utilizing assisted reproductive technologies.
